Everything you need to know when creating

1. I want every artist to have freedom in how he/she wants to create a page for the AnatomyArchive. Stay close to the templates, so that all pages are readable, but don't be shy to alter small things.

2. if you are publishing a page, but it is not finished yet -> write this somewhere:

not final

3. turn on shortcuts, it makes your life easier

4. if possible draw on grey background, so that its appealing in both dark and white mode + users wont get flashed in dark mode

5. avoid using/drawing explicit content as much as you can -> I don't want to age restrict the site, if possible

5. picture:

- width should be minimum 350 pixels so that the image fills the whole mobile width -> click on the little image symbol to adjust pixels
- don't make images longer than a 9:16 aspect ratio, so that they are fully visible on mobile without scrolling
- 840 width images are perfect (for horizontal images)
- avoid putting 2 pictures beside each other

Reference Pictures

I figured that if you want to study anatomy successfully you need as much "**real life footage**" as you can get, so I wanted to include a little library of pictures at the end of every page.

□ When you create a page try to include many viewpoints, male/female looking bodies and a variety of models that show different characteristics.

□ Remember to **not show explicit content**, so that everyone can use AnatomyArchive. If you need to crop or blur explicit parts of the picture, make sure to include that in the citing, e.g. „This image is altered: cropped“

□ **Avoid AI made content** please :)

To avoid legal conflicts and to make distributing AnatomyArchive pages as easy as possible, I insist that you **only use**:

- **Public domain images (CC0)**
- **Free to use pictures without restrictions**
- **Sources that are explicitly stated below (for example a partnership with a model)**

Recommended sources:

- Wikimedia Commons
 - Filter for "No restriction" which means public domain images (CC0)
- Unsplash
 - many good pictures under their free license
- Pixabay
 - no paid license, so everything is usable
