Everything you need to know when creating

First of all

1. You need to have an account for creating a page. You can register [here](#)
2. You should be familiar with the [Terms of Use](#), because the pages you create are free to use* for other people.

The Basics

3. Let's say you want to create a page—here are the first steps:
You go to *Shelves* (top right corner). You choose the *shelf* -> *book* -> *chapter* that is suitable for your page. Create a new page. There should be a template visible for you automatically—from here on out you are guided through the process of creating a full page.

4. For the heading: Include your artist name in brackets and use the official latin name (*Terminologia Anatomica*) for the page heading if possible. Example: Musculus trapezius (xlas)
5. I want every artist to have freedom in how he/she wants to create a page for the AnatomyArchive. Stay close to the templates, so that all pages are readable, but don't be shy to alter small things.
6. Look at the two example pages [Musculus trapezius](#) and [Musculus rectus abdominis](#) for reference. Feel free to copy from them.

Also Important

7. You can save a page as a draft, close the site and work on it later. However, if you publish a page and it is not finished yet -> add the tag "not final" (you can add tags on the right hand side in the page editor) and write this somewhere:

not final

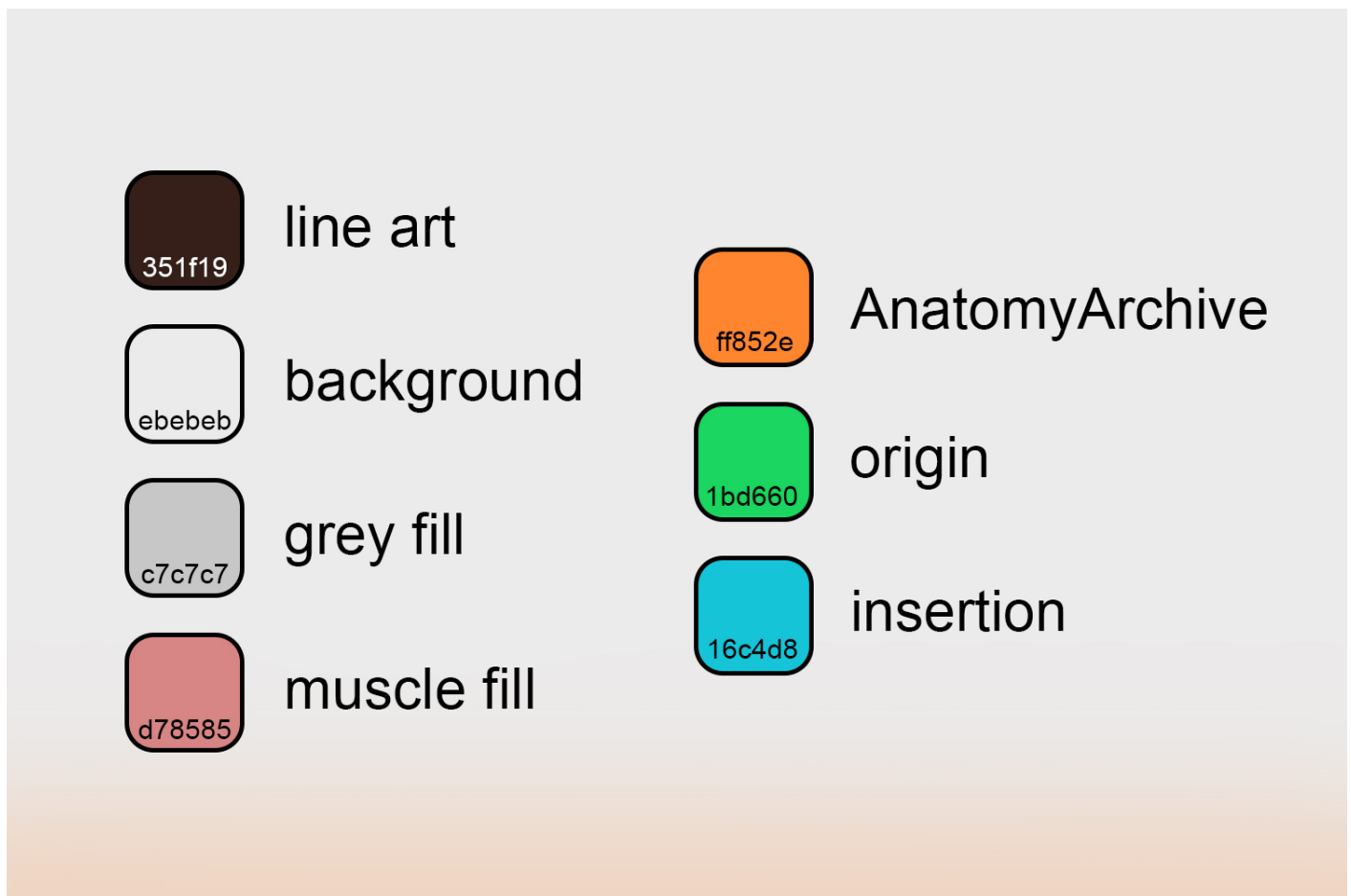
8. Turn on shortcuts, makes your life easier. You can find them in [My Account](#).

9. Avoid using/drawing explicit content as much as you can -> I don't want to age restrict the site, if possible.

The Drawings

- You can technically use any image size you want, but there is a maximum upload size of 20MB per image.
- For digital art I liked 1500x1000px. It is big enough to look good, but doesn't take too much space. Also good for loading times.
- The minimum width however is 350px so that the image fills the whole mobile width
- Avoid putting 2 pictures beside each other (it causes bugs sometimes)
- If possible draw on grey background, so that its appealing in both dark and white mode
- Here is a color sheet for some important colors, in case you want to use them (you don't have to)

Reference Pictures

I figured that if you want to study anatomy successfully you need as much "**real life footage**" as you can get, so I wanted to include a little library of pictures at the end of every page.

□ When you search for reference pictures try to include many viewpoints, male/female looking bodies and a variety of models that show different characteristics.

□ You are not allowed to show genitals in these reference pictures. Exclude the female chest and male/female butt, if not needed.

If you need to crop or blur explicit parts of the picture, make sure to include that in the citing, e.g.

credit to: [Lt. Reid](#); this image is modified (cropped)

□ **Avoid AI made content** please :)

To avoid legal conflicts and to make distributing AnatomyArchive pages as easy as possible, I insist that you **only use** pictures with:

- No citation required:
 - **Public domain images (CC0)**
 - **Free to use pictures without restrictions**
 - **Sources that are explicitly stated below (for example a partnership with a model)**
- Citation required:
 - **CC BY pictures (Creative Commons Attribution license)**

Note: In my personal projects I always try to credit all authors, but sometimes it is just easier to use pictures, where you have zero obligations.

 - Filter for "No restriction" which means public domain images
- [Pixabay](#)
 - No paid license, so everything is usable (public domain)
- [Unsplash](#)
 - Many good pictures under their free license (public domain)
